HAS IS ADDRESSING THE "NEGLECTED EPIDEMIC"

With inpatient occupancy rates at an all-time high of greater than 100% since June 2013, hospital resources at HAS are being challenged on a daily basis.

What keeps me awake at night is the acuity of cases we are seeing. A year ago, HAS patients remained in the hospital for an average of 4.2 days; today the average is 5.2 days, and we have seen a slow but steady increase for many months.

Why is this occurring, and what can we do to address it?

Road improvements made possible by the influx of post-earthquake funds to Haiti have resulted in an unintended consequence: many more traumatic injuries caused by traffic accidents. Such injuries often require surgery, usually orthopedic trauma surgery, and patients recovering from this surgery require physical therapy. Therefore, the average length of stay in the HAS surgery unit is now double the hospital average at 10 days per patient.

This trend is concerning, and we must marshal the resources required to address it. HAS is already undertaking a major expansion of its emergency facilities, thanks to a grant from American Schools and Hospitals Abroad, a unit of USAID, as well as support from Jones Day Foundation and other private donors.

Ideally, HAS also would have a full-time orthopedic surgeon on staff. Today, we rely on a staff general surgeon and visiting volunteer orthopedists to provide this specialized care.

We also must update hospital equipment essential to trauma care. A digital x-ray system, for example, would improve image quality and vastly improve efficiency, while enabling HAS to share x-rays with specialists working all over the world, simply by sending an email.

Perhaps most importantly, we must develop resources to collaborate with the community to address the root causes of the problem. We must integrate education about road safety and prevention into community and health center presentations, community outreach, and follow-up care with road traffic accident victims and their families. Topics must include the importance of seat belt and helmet wearing, and the terrible risks associated with driving at unsafe speeds.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), injuries are a neglected epidemic in developing countries, causing more than five million deaths each year, roughly equal to the number of deaths from HIV/AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis combined.

"Injuries contribute to poverty, as the economic and social costs impact individuals, communities and societies," the WHO report states.

At HAS, we aim to develop creative, practical strategies to address this problem in both our hospital and community services, and work to identify partners who can help us execute plans.

As plans take shape, you will hear more from us on this important issue. Meanwhile, know that your support is helping HAS provide the best care possible, despite the challenges.

STAFF PERSPECTIVE

"HAS IS FAR MORE THAN A HOSPITAL."

I am a family medicine specialist and a native of Haiti. After completing medical school in Cuba, I returned to my home country because I knew that Haiti has a great need for excellent healthcare.

I have worked throughout the country as a physician and as an administrator, and spent the last few years working for Management Sciences for Health (MSH), a global health nonprofit helping leaders, health managers, and communities in developing nations build stronger health systems for greater health impact. There, I oversaw nongovernmental partners – a total of 32 institutions funded by MSH in that region.

HAS was among them, and, in my view, it was the best performing, most disciplined, and most open to change of all the institutions in my zone. HAS usually received less funding from MSH than other institutions, but always did more with it.

When asked if I would be interested in coming to work at HAS, I accepted immediately; I knew that working here would reinforce my vision of building a better healthcare

system in Haiti. There is a great team here doing very real work. We are working with the community and helping to change the conditions in places like the mountains in Bastien and Tienne, where state services do not reach.

Community health workers are the base of this organization. They support the work of HAS nurses, nurses' aides, and doctors in an integrated health system. This base is already strong, and I hope to reinforce it in three ways:

- With training and continuing education for community health workers and other key staff;
- By ensuring that our work is evidence-based – based on proven practices for preventing the spread of infectious disease, for example;
- And by strengthening our team's links with the community and with colleagues at the hospital to ensure the best possible continuum of care.

HAS is far more than a hospital; it is a truly integrated healthcare system. We are working to improve this system through better collaboration within Haiti, and with the help of our supporters abroad.

HAS is a beautiful institution, and our work is making a difference in the lives of hundreds of thousands of people each year.
